

THE CHRISTIAN SCIENCE MONITOR TABLE

The Christian Science Monitor is a Pulitzer Prize-winning, international news publication. Founded in 1908 by Mary Baker Eddy, it was intended to be a fair, honest news source that would be welcomed in any home.

Both the print *Weekly* and the electronic *Daily* offer a variety of stories from politics to culture to the environment and a calm reporting style that encourages you to come to your own conclusions about the news of the day around the world.

A GLOBAL STATEMENT


The global outlook of The Christian Science Publishing Society is reflected in the *Mapparium* exhibit—a remarkable architectural statement that is as relevant today as when its doors first opened in 1935. Originally intended by architect Chester Lindsay Churchill to be updated as borders shifted, the glass panels stand unchanged since they were completed, offering a snapshot of a world that would undergo immense changes in the years to come.


FACES OF CHANGE





The Mary Baker Eddy Library



Since its opening in 2002, the Library has offered a place to explore the life, ideas, and achievements of Mary Baker Eddy—a pioneer in religion, whose

work touched the fields of health, publishing, education, and business.

The Library houses a vast collection of original materials that document Mary Baker Eddy's life and the Church she founded. Samples of the collections are available to explore in a virtual exhibit on the first floor.

Christian Science and Mary Baker Eddy

This walk-through exhibit asks: How can we reliably apply the ideas in the Bible to our lives today? What truths in its pages hold implications for how we each see the world and one another?

Mary Baker Eddy (1821–1910) sought answers to these questions. Out of her lifelong love and engagement with the Bible came her discovery and founding of Christian Science and its global Church.



MARY BAKER EDDY: A LIFE OF DISCOVERY

A ten-minute, biographical film of Mary Baker Eddy's life examines her understanding of the inseparable relationship between true science and true Christianity. Interactive electronic books as well as historical artifacts highlight Biblical themes central to the practice of Christian Science.
